

Washington she only has a ten minute drive to this place of hope and support for their many clients who come from the far eastern part of Hamilton County. Inter Parish Ministry is a Choice Food and Clothing Pantry that provides "food, clothing and other communal support to those in need and empowers clients with information, support and services to improve their lives." (Mission Statement) Though her main responsibilities there are in the administrative area, she values the times she has when she interacts with the clients, the many volunteers and benefactors each day. Their stories and life situations provide her with eyes to see other aspects of this journey we call "life."
